We know that many of you will want to get your applications in now, having seen that some of your friends have already registered.

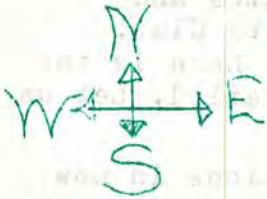

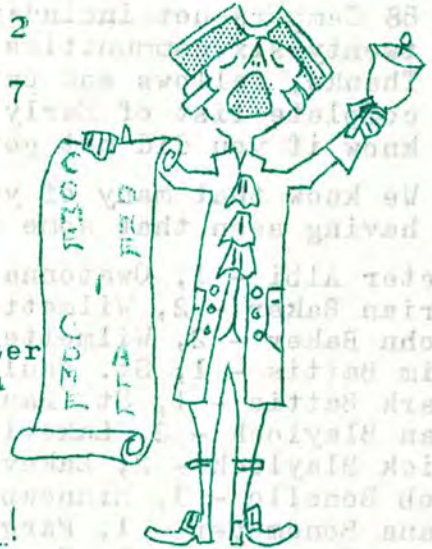

STEVE STEDMAN, JOHN TIMMONS, and MIKE LICKTEIG are all classmates at Loras College in Dubuque.

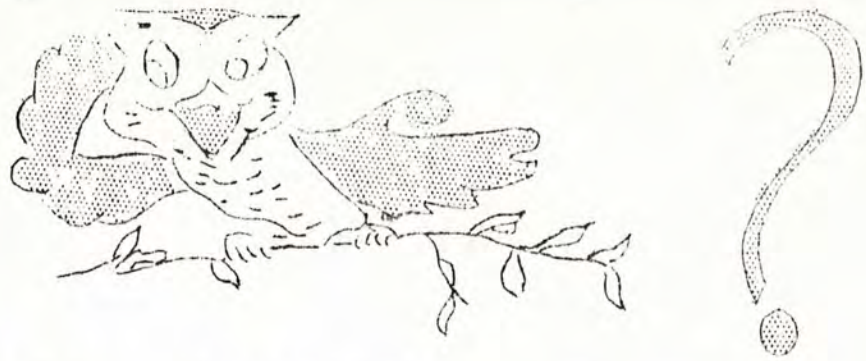

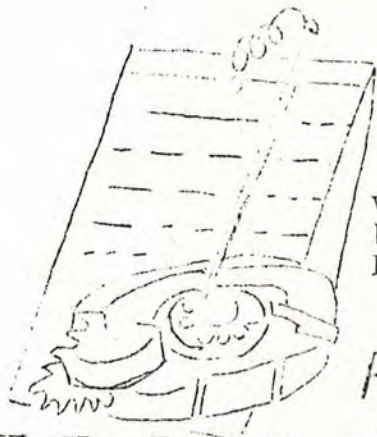

## STAFF NEWS

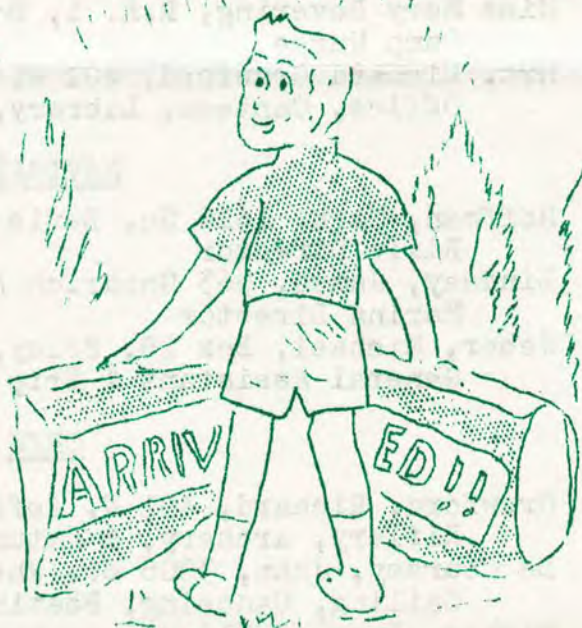

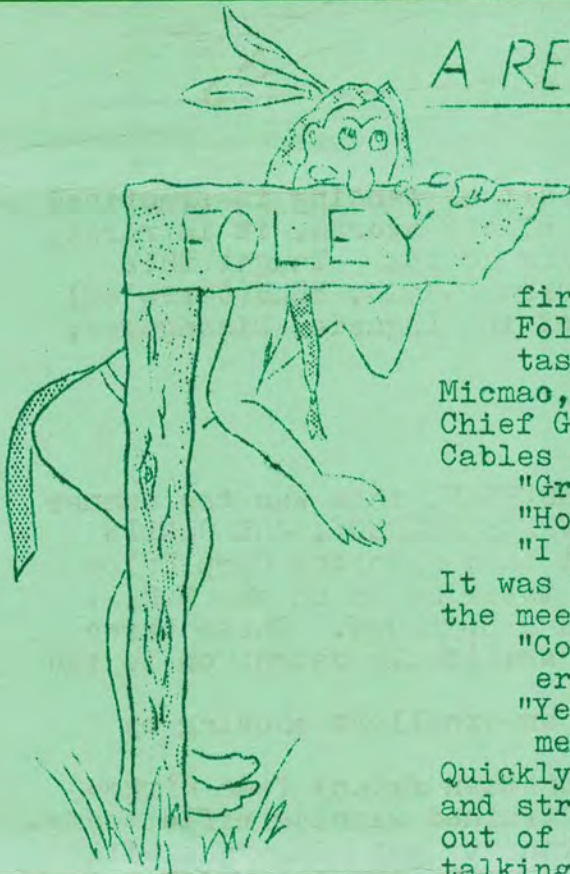

"Spread the word, oh Bird. Summon the chiefs to our fireside."

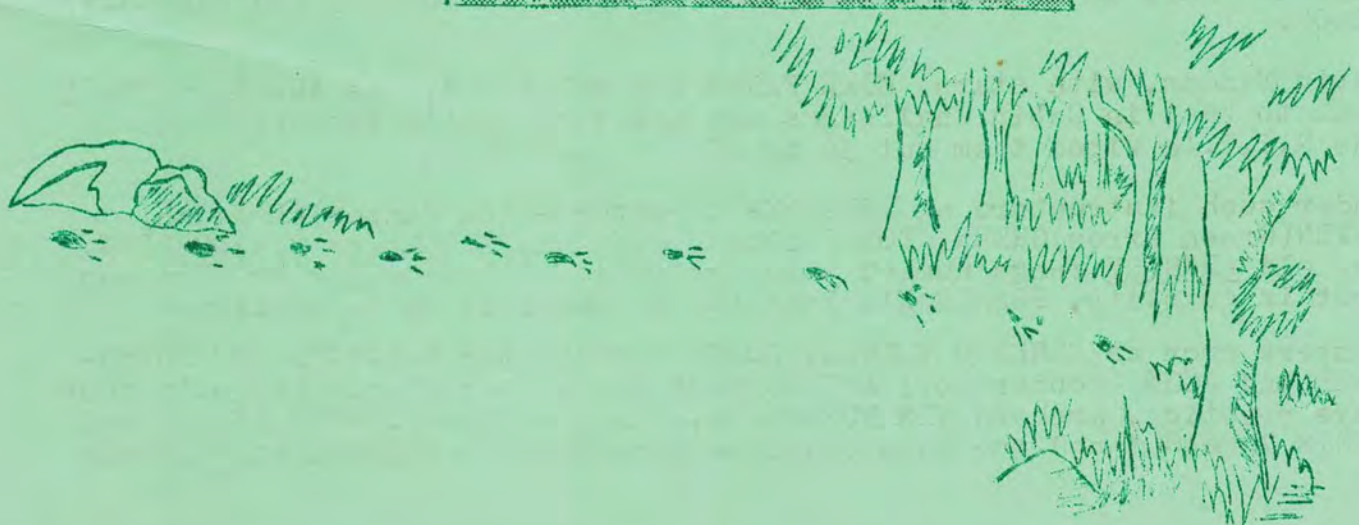

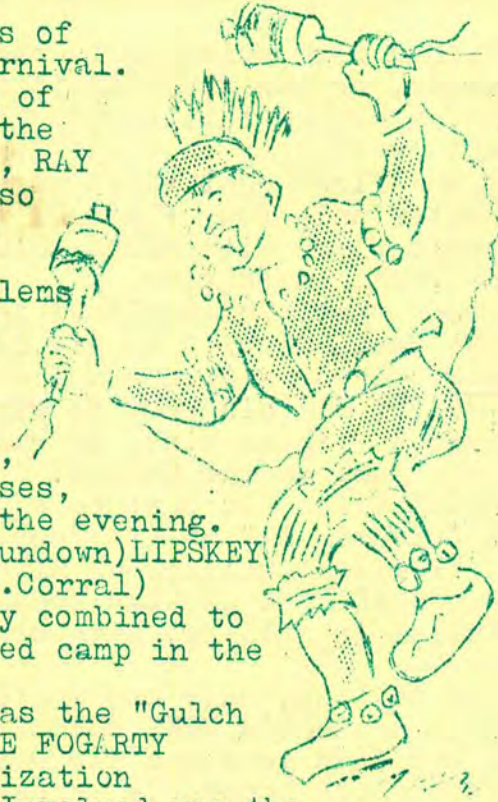
Once again the good Sisters came through for Water Day and supplied us with cookies used in the Relay Race.

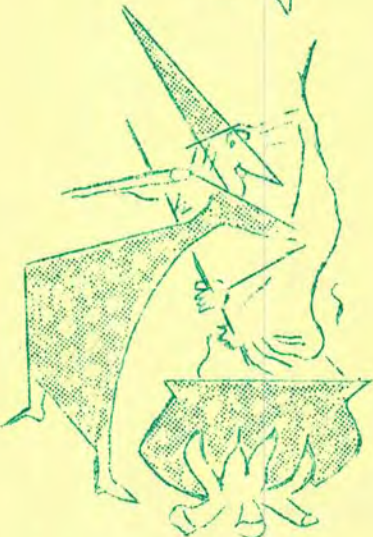
